

April 14, 1874. **CHAP. 95.**—An act granting a pension to Caleb A. Lamb, late a musician in Company E of the Forty-sixth Regiment of Indiana Volunteer Infantry.

Pension to Caleb A. Lamb. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to place upon the pension-roll, subject to the provisions and limitations of the pension-laws, the name of Caleb A. Lamb, late a musician in Company E of the Forty-sixth Regiment of Indiana Volunteer Infantry, to take effect from and after the passage of this act.

April 15, 1874. **CHAP. 101.**—An act for the relief of Richard H. Dutton, postmaster at Cavendish, Vermont.

Credit in accounts of Richard H. Dutton. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That the Auditor of the Treasury for the Post-Office Department is hereby directed to credit Richard H. Dutton, postmaster at Cavendish, in the State of Vermont, in his account as such postmaster, with the sum of one hundred and twenty-eight dollars and sixty-eight cents, being the amount of postage-stamps stolen from the safe of said post office by burglars on the night of the twenty-first day of October, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, without fault or negligence on the part of said postmaster.

April 15, 1874. **CHAP. 102.**—An act for the relief of George W. Keyes.

Credit in accounts of George W. Keyes. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That the Auditor of the Treasury for the Post-Office Department be directed to credit George W. Keyes, postmaster at Olivet, Michigan, in his account as such postmaster, with the sum of one hundred and six dollars and fifty cents, being the amount of postage stamps burglariously stolen from the safe where said stamps were deposited, on the night of the fifth of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, without fault or negligence on the part of said postmaster.

April 15, 1874. **CHAP. 103.**—An act for the relief of Sarah F. Lincoln, postmaster at Spencerport, Monroe county, New York.

Credit in accounts of Sarah F. Lincoln. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That the Auditor of the Treasury for the Post-Office Department is hereby directed to credit Sarah F. Lincoln, postmaster at Spencerport, Monroe county, New York, in her account as postmaster, with the sum of five hundred and sixteen dollars and twenty cents, being the amount of postage stamps stolen from the safe of said post-office by burglars on the night of the third day of January, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, without fault or negligence on the part of said postmaster.
