Additional article of agreement between the Post Office Departments of the United States of America and Newfoundland.

Sept. 26 and Oct.

SOLE ARTICLE.

It is agreed that the single rate of international letter-postage, in ful to destination, shall be five cents on each letter weighing half an ounce (15 grammes) or less, and an additional rate of five cents for each additional weight of half an ounce (15 grammes) or fraction thereof, the prepayment of which shall be compulsory at the office of mailing in either country.

This article shall take effect immediately, superseding the provisions of the second paragraph of article 3 of the Postal Convention of 13-20 November, 1872, which paragraph is hereby rescinded.

In witness whereof the Postmaster General of the United States of rescinded. America and the Postmaster General of Newfoundland have hereto set their hands and affixed their seals at the date set opposite to each respectively.
