

PRIVATE ACTS OF THE FIFTY-FIRST CONGRESS

OF THE

UNITED STATES,

Passed at the first session, which was begun and held at the city of Washington, in the District of Columbia, on Monday, the second day of December, 1889, and was adjourned without day on Wednesday, the first day of October, 1890.

BENJAMIN HARRISON, President; LEVI P. MORTON, Vice-President, and President of the Senate; JOHN J. INGALLS was elected President of the Senate *pro tempore* February twenty-eighth, 1890, and continued to act as such until March the nineteenth, when the Vice-President resumed the duties of President of the Senate; on the third day of April, JOHN J. INGALLS was elected President of the Senate *pro tempore*, and continued to act as such during the subsequent temporary absences of the Vice-President; THOMAS B. REED was elected Speaker of the House of Representatives December second, 1889; JULIUS C. BURROWS was elected Speaker *pro tempore* May twenty-sixth, 1890; Mr. REED resumed the duties of Speaker May twenty eighth; JULIUS C. BURROWS was elected Speaker *pro tempore* September third; Mr. REED resumed the duties of Speaker September twelfth.

CHAP. 30.—An act for the relief of the heirs of Noah W. Yoder.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to adjudicate the pension claim of Catharine Z Yoder, late widow of Noah W. Yoder, second lieutenant of Company G, Fifty-first Regiment Ohio Volunteers, and pay to the surviving children of said Noah W. Yoder a pension at the rate provided by the general pension laws, from the date of his death until they severally arrive at the age of sixteen years.

Whereas, a pension of one hundred dollars per month is allowed by act of Congress approved February twelfth, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, to those who lost both hands, and loss of use of both hands is just a severe a disability, requiring the same aid and attention, and said Elmer A. Snow was then totally disabled in both hands from gunshot wounds received in line of duty: Therefore,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to place on the pension-roll, the name of Elmer A. Snow, late a trumpeter in M Troop, Third United States Cavalry, and pay him a pension of one hundred dollars per month; in lieu of the pension now received by him.

CHAP. 59.—An act for the relief of the owners, officers, and crew of the British bark Chance.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of State be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to draw his requisition upon the Secretary of the Treasury for the payment, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, of the sum of sixteen thousand dollars to the duly accredited representative of the Government of Great Britain at Washington, to enable said Government to pay the same to the owners of the British bark Chance, of the port of Sydney, New South Wales, to indemnify them, and the officers and crew of said bark, for abandoning their whaling voyage in the Arctic Ocean, in the month of September, in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and rescuing from shipwreck ninety-six American seamen and transporting them to Honolulu.

[No. 37.] Joint resolution to permit Captain George W. Davis, United States Army, to accept a position in the Nicaragua Canal Construction Company.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That Captain George W. Davis, Fourteenth Regiment United States Infantry, be, and he hereby is, permitted to enter the service of the Nicaragua Canal Construction Company. The permission hereby given shall be held to terminate at such date as the Secretary of War may determine: Provided, however, That the said Davis shall not receive from the United States any pay or allowances as an Army officer during the period of his absence from the military service under the provisions of this resolution.
