Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to place upon the pension-roll, subject to the provisions and limitations of the general pension laws, the name of Easter A. Jackson, widow of Moses H. Jackson, Company D, First Tennessee Mounted Infantry.

Richards, late private of Company B, Eighteenth Regiment Indiana Infantry.

CHAP. 99.—An act to remove political disabilities of D. C. Stith, a citizen of Texas.D. C. Stith.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all political disabilities imposed by the fourteenth amendment of the Constitution of the United States by participation in the late rebellion be, and the same are hereby, removed from D. C. Stith, a citizen of the State of Texas.

CHAP. 102.—An act for the relief of Daniel V. O'Leary.Daniel V. O'Leary.
Payment to.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and is hereby, directed to re-imburse, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of three thousand five hundred and thirty-six dollars and sixty cents to Daniel V. O'Leary, postmaster at Albany, New York, for postage-stamps and postal funds stolen from the post-office at said city April twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and eighty-eight
