in section twenty-six, in township one hundred and ten north of range twenty-nine west, in the district of lands subject to entry at the United States local land office at Marshall, in the State of Minnesota, made by one Fred Kormann on the sixth day of March, eighteen hundred and ninety-one, be, and the same is hereby, confirmed, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office is hereby authorized and directed to issue a patent therefor.

CHAP. 234.—An Act Granting an increase of pension to Thomas M. Chill.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to place on the pension roll, subject to the provisions and limitations of the pension laws, the name of Thomas M. Chill, a private in the Black Hawk war of eighteen hundred and thirty-two, and pay him a pension at the rate of twelve dollars per month in lieu of the pension he is now receiving.

CHAP. 235.—An Act Granting a pension to Charles F. Holly.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he hereby is, directed to place on the pension roll the name of Charles F. Holly, late captain of Company H, Second Regiment of Colorado Volunteer Cavalry, and pay him a pension at the rate of thirty-six dollars per month from the passage of this Act in lieu of the pension he is now receiving.

CHAP. 236.—An Act Granting an increase of pension to Eugenia R. Sweeny.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to place on the pension roll the name of Eugenia R. Sweeny, widow of Thomas W. Sweeny, late a brigadier-general in the Army of the United States, at the rate of thirty dollars per month, in lieu of the pension she is now receiving.

CHAP. 237.-An Act For the relief of James Curran.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Postmaster-General Jame Credit be, and is hereby, authorized and directed to give credit to James Courts. Curran, postmaster at Hoboken, New Jersey, in the sum of six thousand five hundred and sixty-six dollars for postage stamps stolen from said office on the third day of December, eighteen hundred and ninetyfour, through no fault of the said James Curran.
