Passed at the first session, which was begin and held at the City of Washington, in the District of Columbia, on Monday, the second day of December, 1901, and was adjourned without day on Tuesday, the first day of July, 1902.

**CHAP. 4.**—An Act Providing for the free transportation of all mail matter sent by Mrs. Ida S. McKinley.

January 22, 1902. \*\*
[Private, No. 1.]

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all mail matter sent by the post by Ida S. McKinley, widow of the late William McKinley, granted to. under her written autograph signature, be conveyed free of postage during her natural life.

Ida S. McKinley. Franking privilege rranted to.

CHAP. 8.—An Act Granting a pension to Mary E. Davis.

February 5, 1902.

[Private, No. 2.]

Mary E. Davis. Pension.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to place on the pension roll, subject to the provisions and limitations of the pension laws, the name of Mary E. Davis, widow of Charles M. Davis, late of Company B, One hundred and twenty-seventh Regiment United States Colored Volunteer Infantry, and pay her a pension at the rate of eight dollars per month.

CHAP. 9.—An Act Granting an increase of pension to Elizabeth O. Gould.

February 5, 1902.

[Private, No. 3.]

Elizabeth O. Gould, Pension increased.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to place on the pension roll, subject to the provisions and limitations of the pension laws, the name of Elizabeth O. Gould, widow of Edward F. Gould, late first lieutenant Company D, Eighth Regiment Vermont Volunteer Infantry, and pay her a pension at the rate of seventeen dollars per month in lieu of that she is now receiving.
